New Acquisition at Museum

The Foundation museum welcomes visitors to view some new additions to the current exhibit - *Taking Care of Business: Past and Present Sainte Marie Businesses*, which will be open for a few more months.

Of special interest will be a <u>new donation</u> to the museum: a small book of handwritten poetry, which caught the eye of a central-Illinois woman who was shopping in an antique store. Here's the story behind this acquisition, written by Foundation VP Gina Mullinax Fox.

A Poetry Book from Early Ste. Marie

by Gina Fox

"Heap them in drifts about us All that our arms can hold. Bury our staggered senses deep In their hearts of gold."

The above poem was included in a small book of handwritten poetry that caught the eye of Tuscola resident **Cynthia Pringle** while she was browsing at the Buggy Wheel Antique Shop in Arthur, IL.

Written in flowery script on the inside cover of the booklet was "Ste. Marie, Ill. June 1906, H. Huber". Pringle posted a picture on Facebook hoping to find someone who knew of the owner of the beautiful handwriting. Answers came quickly when relatives identified the young writer as (H)Ellen Huber who was 18 years of age at the time she wrote the booklet. Cynthia was delighted to discover not only the writer of

the booklet, but that Ste. Marie had a museum at the Ste. Marie Foundation house. She very generously offered to gift the item to the museum.

Some Huber history

Growing up on a sand hill east of Ste. Marie, (H)Ellen was the third of seven children of Herman and Mary Josephine (Valbert) Huber. Her beloved grandfather, Joseph Petar Huber, was the first in his family to come to America. Joseph was born in Bavaria, Germany, in 1823, landed in New York in 1848, traveled to Philadelphia and worked there for several years, learning the language and saving money. Moving westward to Ohio, he met and married Crescentia Rodering in 1855. They lived for a time in Franklin, IN, where they had four sons. The family of six moved again, landing in Ste. Marie around 1870. According to Mayme Huber Hartrich, his granddaughter, Joseph Huber was a devout Catholic and thought it prophetic that his young family happened upon the village of Ste. Marie on the eve of the Immaculate Conception, an important church holiday. Crescentia passed away seven years later.

Shortly thereafter, Joseph built the brick house that would serve as home for five generations The two-story house was constructed from the property's great white oaks and hand-dug and kilned bricks made from the clay of the usually quiet Embarras River. The house that took three and a half years to construct was home to the five Huber men. After the youngest son, Herman, married in 1883, the house was soon filled with the sounds of young ones. Grandfather Joseph and Herman's brother, Joseph, continued to live on at the house until their deaths.

Family Life with the Hubers

Life was full of simple pleasures at the busy farm. With eleven people to feed, there was always something to do, whether it was cooking, laundry, farming, canning, or gardening. Memorizing and copying poetry in one's best handwriting was a very common practice in schools around the turn of the century. Playing the piano, singing, reading, and playing cards were favorite pastimes of the young girls from the sand ridge.

Ellen married George Schackman in 1910, starting their married life in the village of Ste. Marie. Sometime before 1920, they moved near Tuscola, II, and purchased a farm. George and Helen did not have any children. George died in 1953, and Ellen died 21 years later in 1974.

Ellen's thoughts live on through this small poetry book, now on display at the Sainte Marie Foundation Museum.

Lucille M. Dallmier, 92. Survived by 11 children, 48 grandchildren, 70 great-grandchildren, and 2 great-grandchildren. Husband Lorraine died in 2012.

Loren A. Gallion, Sr., 96, and Mamie L. Gallion, 92. Survived by a son and a daughter as well as numerous

grandchildren. Loren passed first and Mamie several weeks later.

Harold Edward Kocher, 84. Harold and his wife Clara donated a very valuable pix to the Foundation in recent years. -- Fr. Vernich and the original St. Mary's Church in a very ornate frame. We thank them (Clara survives) and their family for the donation of this picture to our collection.

Alice Keller's Never-Fail Pie Crust

Enough for 2 – two-crust pies and a pie shell

Ingredients

1¾ cups of lard (this is THE secret ingredient)

5 cups all-purpose flour

½ cup sugar

1 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon baking powder

2 egg yolks

1 tablespoon vinegar

Water, as needed

Cut lard into dry ingredients with a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Mix egg yolks in a 1-cup measuring cup and beat slightly, add the vinegar and enough

cool water to make 1 cup of liquid. Add mixture gradually to the dry ingredients tossing with a fork to dampen evenly. Press dough into a ball. Use as you wish. A portion may be refrigerated for use later in the week.

Alice Keller's Pecan Pie

Ingredients
1 cup of brown sugar
½ cup white sugar
1 tablespoon flour
2 eggs

2 tablespoons milk 1 teaspoon real vanilla 1 stick real butter, melted 1 cup chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350 F. Combine sugars and flours in a small bowl. Stir in remaining ingredients, reserving a few whole pecans for the top if desired. Pour into unbaked pie crust. Cover the edges of crust with aluminum foil to keep from darkening. Bake 40-50 minutes or until set.

Alice's background

Alice Cunningham Keller was born on May 12, 1929 and grew up in the "Pond Grove" area south of Sainte Marie; the daughter of farmer and township supervisor, Ralph Cunningham and Mary (Zuber) Cunningham. On October 4, 1950, Alice married Arthur Keller, youngest of the James and Louise (Huber) Keller family. Alice and Art raised 7 children, Bob, Dan, Bev, Kathy, Mike, Mary Lou and Steve.

Like most farm wives of her era, Alice Keller was frugal. She had a big vegetable garden that would produce early fresh delights such as peas, butter crunch and oak leaf lettuce, radishes, cabbage, carrots, spinach, baby lima beans, sweet corn and asparagus. She "canned" green beans, bread & butter pickles and lime pickles, pickled beets, whole tomatoes, tomato juice, black raspberry jelly and more. And of course, there would be a whole day or two of "putting up" corn for the freezer. In the fall there would be turnips, winter radishes along with a later planting of lettuce, green beans and Illini Extra Sweet corn.

And all the garden seeds came from the **Alblinger & Kirts Hardware** in Sainte Marie.

Alice also made a lot of her and her daughters' clothes; she crocheted and later in life made many beautiful quilts that she shared with her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Most of the time, Alice didn't use a recipe. She just put together mouthwatering homemade meals like baked old hen for Sunday dinners with homemade noodles or dumplings; beef roast that would melt in your mouth with potatoes, carrots and gravy or fresh fried chicken, mashed potatoes and gravy. Alice could whip up a meal for nine and there was always extra for anyone who

might be there when it was time to eat. For me, an only child and one of those extras at the dinner table on Sundays from 1969 to 1973 while Bob and I were still dating, I was amazed she could cook for an army and make it look so easy.

Alice had a sweet tooth, and even though she was always "dieting", she loved to make dessert for her family and could be seen sneaking a little sliver of pie, etc. when she thought no one was looking. She always made sure to make everyone's favorite for their birthdays...her favorite was angel food cake.

The recipes on the previous page are two of Alice's recipes that I have used for 45 years this June 16th. I'm happy to be able to share those with you. The pie crust recipe has exact measurements and always turns out perfect, and the pecan pie made me <u>like</u> pecan pie, which I never did before tasting Alice's. (*From Donna Keller*)

Chris Zwilling, Champaign, IL, contacted us because he saw the Foundation website (www.saintemariefoundation.org) on the internet. The son of Ron and Nancy Wagner Zwilling, he's doing some interesting work at the U of I Champaign. He's another of those former Ste. Marie-area residents who make us all so proud! Here's what he wrote when I asked him what he was doing at the U of I:

Right now I am a postdoc at the Beckman Institute. I completed my PhD in Quantitative Psychology and Statistics at U of I in 2016. I work in a psychology/neuroscience lab that studies how people can improve memory, decision-making and intelligence through lifestyle factors--like exercise and nutrition. It's pretty neat. One of the studies we recently completed involved diets of healthy older adults (65-75) to see how the food people ate affected their cognitive ability.

Healthy aging is an important area of research, and I am sure will continue to be. While we have not yet studied it in our lab, one factor that keeps popping up in the research literature is the value of one's social network as they age (but, of course, at any age it is important!). Time and time again, to the extent that a person has a strong social circle, it can trump a lot of other factors that might otherwise be problematic.

I had asked **Mandy Huber**, **daughter of Sam and Linda Zuber**, for an update, as this is a young family that has moved around a great deal, because husband **Steve** is a career officer in the Army. We welcomed **Isaac Christopher** into the family August 31, 2017. And yes...we know what causes that...deployments (according to Steve).
